First Year Students

Boston College Law School adheres to the NALP guidelines for first year hiring. First years may participate in any recruitment program after December 1st.

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Diversity

We participate in the Boston Lawyers' Group Minority Student Mentor Program and other career related programming the organization sponsors, including mock interviews, a job fair, a writing program and networking opportunities. We also support our students as they interview at other diversity job fairs including Lavender Law and Impact. Our Associate Dean of Diversity and Inclusion runs a monthly seminar for our diverse students on campus to help them prepare for entering the profession. This also involves helping to develop their interviewing and networking skills in advance of recruitment season.

Pro Bono

As a Jesuit institution, Boston College Law School (BC Law) prides itself on its commitment to public service. This commitment is evidence by the breadth of BC Law's curriculum, clinical program, scholarships, student organizations and pro bono opportunities. BC Law has a vibrant community of students, faculty, staff and alumni involved in public service, from the two-day Public Interest Retreat (open to all law students) to the University-wide "Grads Give Back" day of service to our launch of the pro bono spring break program, our commitment to pro bono runs deep. While we formalized our Pro Bono Program in 2008, there are now over 200 current students participating in the program. These students provide pro bono assistance to government agencies, non-profits, and NGOs, in Boston, throughout the US, and around the world. Over 34% of the class of 2016 volunteered more than 13,500 hours of service. During our pro bono Spring Break 2016, more than 60 students participated in pro bono work providing over 2,205 hours of service. Students provided immigration pro bono service to non-profits in Texas, Arizona, New York, Washington, DC, Florida, and California. Students also worked with government agencies and non-profits to provide pro bono legal services in New Orleans, Navajo Nation, as well as locally in the Boston area. Every graduate who provides fifty hours of pro bono service receives recognition at the Graduation Awards Celebration. Students who complete the voluntary Pro Bono Pledge of 50 hours of service may also participate in the Public Interest Designation Program (PIDP). The PIDP is designed to encourage, guide, and recognize students who are committed to public service. The PIDP is a holistic approach to legal education which prepares students both academically and experientially to begin a career in the public sector immediately upon graduation. Students who complete the Program's four academic and experiential requirements are designated as Public Interest Designation Fellows. The requirements to be named Fellows are: · Complete 15 credits of public interest coursework. · Participate in experiential learning offerings at a public interest placement. \cdot Spend at least one summer interning with a public sector employer. · Complete BC Law's pro bono pledge by participating in 50 hours of public service. Over 17% of the Class of 2016 have been named as Public Interest Designation Fellows.
